Funding News

Professor <u>Steven Hankey</u> has become the first SPIA and CAUS faculty member to receive the prestigious career award from the National Science Foundation (NSF). Steve received this \$500,000 grant for a project entitled "Leveraging mobile monitoring, low-cost sensors, and Google Street View imagery to identify and modify street-level determinants of exposure to particulate air pollution." The award starts in July 2020 and ends June 2025. Please join me in congratulating Steve on this fantastic accomplishment.

Our colleagues in SPIA Richmond also have ample cause for celebration. The Governor of Virginia has approved funding for the third cohort of the <u>Virginia Management Fellows</u> (VMF)

Program. This sponsored program is a part of a larger research effort analyzing the succession planning projects and initiatives of the Commonwealth of Virginia. With the announcement of this new cohort, the Commonwealth -- by vote of the Virginia General Assembly -- has invested \$1,050,000 in sponsored research for SPIA's Applied Research Campus leadership and for study of the VMF program. We are proud of the signal this award sends and the contribution of our Richmond team to enhancing the bench strength for our wonderful state of Virginia.

The Virginia Higher Education Opioid Consortium (VHEOC) has awarded a grant to SPIA's Institute for Policy & Governance for a project entitled "The Regional Detox Community Action Plan (RDAP)." This project will support the Piedmont Community Service Board (CSB) and other stakeholder efforts in Martinsville to establish a regional detox center. After an initial review of the region's population health indicators and community engagement efforts to date, the project team will facilitate regional engagement for planning and implementing the detox center.

Upon the successful approval by the GO Virginia state board of funding for efforts to enhance the technology ecosystem in the Roanoke, New River Valley and Lynchburg regions, VT SPIA will be bringing on Ellen Plowman as a Program Associate to support this new project for the Spring 2020 semester.

As a community, let's recognize SPIA alumni like <u>Sabith Khan</u> (Ph.D., 2015), <u>Samantha Fenn</u> (MPA, 2019) and <u>Ellie Muraca</u> (BA, 2018) for the wonderful work they are doing and wish current students such as <u>Miles Polhamus</u> more success.

Thanks are also due to Nicolau Miguel, a 2019 <u>Mandela Washington Fellow</u>, who represented SPIA at the U.S. College Fair in Luanda, Angola on November 20, 2019.
