Alumni and Student News

<u>Nada Alwadi</u> (PGG doctoral candidate) launched her new podcast series, "<u>American Highlights</u>," sharing insights on American history and society with Arabic-speaking audiences.

Bertha Anderson (PhD, CPAP) talks about her work as the Chief of Public Engagement for the Citizenship and Immigration Services Ombudsman's office in this interview.

<u>Laura Castro</u> (MURP student), the inaugural recipient of the Community Scholars Fellowship of the Master's of Urban and Regional Planning program, attended the Virginia Chapter of the American Planning Association annual conference. There, she received a certificate recognizing her contributions to advancing diversity, equity, and inclusion in the profession of urban planning. She was also featured in this month's <u>Member Spotlight of the APA VA</u>.

<u>Farhad Hassan</u> (PGG doctoral candidate) <u>published</u> "Party corruption in the Kurdistan Region of Iraq: Context and implications," in *The Digest of Middle East Studies*.

<u>Lechuan Huang</u> (former SPIA undergraduate student mentored by Dr. Theo Lim and now a master's

student of Urban Spatial Analytics at the University of Pennsylvania) published his first peer-reviewed article in *Sustainability*. The article, titled "<u>Interdisciplinary inquiry and spatial green stormwater infrastructure research</u>," uses mixed methods to explore how different disciplines frame and approach green stormwater infrastructure research. Co-authors include Dr. Theo Lim and Dr. Shalini Misra.

<u>Madeline Sefcik</u>, who earned her graduate certificate in Local Government Management from SPIA in 2020, was <u>chosen</u> as a 40 Under 40 by *The Ronoaker*.

Faculty News

<u>Mehrzad Boroujerdi</u> (SPIA Director) <u>published</u> an article entitled "Who's on Iran's current nuclear negotiating team?" in The Atlantic Council blog.

Ralph Buehler (UAP Professor, UAP): Only 10 months after the book's original release, MIT Press reprinted Ralph's edited book "Cycling for Sustainable Cities." The book gives a global overview on how to make city cycling—the most sustainable means of travel—safe, practical, and convenient for all. Buehler's research was mentioned in an article about the future of bicycling. At the TRB annual meeting, Buehler gave two presentations of a paper on bicycling in Washington, DC and Frankfurt, Germany, coauthored with MURP student Brian Shelton and PGG candidate Denis Teoman.

<u>Karen Hult</u> (Professor, CPAP) <u>commented</u> on the one year anniversary of the capitol riots and was also interviewed about it.

Theo Lim (Assistant Professor, UAP) published an article in Environmental Science & Technology. This article explores the conditions under which small-scale community energy infrastructure can be operated to remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. Also called "negative emissions technologies," carbon dioxide removal is usually presumed to occur through large, centralized facilities. Dr. Lim's research demonstrates a case where communities can maintain energy, carbon, and land sovereignty while contributing to climate mitigation. This interdisciplinary research was done in collaboration with Amanda Cuellar, Kyle Langseth, and Jeff Waldon, who specialize in thermochemical modeling, engineering, and land conservation, respectively, and was funded by a grant awarded to Theo Lim by the +Policy program at VT. Also, Theo and former PGG PhD student Kaidi Wang (now an assistant professor at Macao University of Science and Technology) published an article in Computers and Geosciences. This work contributes to understanding how to improve the speed and reduce the computational resources of spatial computer models using machine learning and artificial intelligence algorithms, which is important for spatial decision support. In December, Prof. Lim presented a poster at the American Geophysical Union's Fall Conference. Finally, Theo was also invited to give a talk titled "Building community resilience to extreme heat through youth engagement" at the Kiwanis Club of Roanoke.

<u>Gerard Toal</u> (Professor, GIA) published an <u>article</u> in *The Irish Times* entitled "Delusion on all sides has paved way for Russia-NATO standoff." Gerard also co-authored an <u>article</u> in the Washington Post's Monkey Cage on Ukrainians views on NATO exercises close to Russia.

Impactful Research

Over the past two years, a team from Virginia Tech, Egerton University, and the Australian startup AgUnity have been studying the African Indigenous Vegetable (AIV) value chain in Kakamega county (Western Kenya), to determine if a new blockchain-based smartphone app could help improve livelihoods, nutrition, and value chain efficiency for last-mile agricultural communities. Digital Advertising

SPIA recently launched its first digital advertising campaigns to introduce more prospective students in Virginia and the Southwest region to its nationally recognized undergraduate and graduate programs. Advertisements began appearing in Google search results earlier this month to users in select areas searching for relevant keywords like "urban planning degree" and "public administration programs." This year's strategy builds on a successful MURP digital marketing effort last year led by UAP program chair Dr. Ralph Buehler, SPIA administrative operations coordinator Natalia Gutierrez-Smith, and MURP student/marketing consultant Trey Gordner. "We expect SPIA's first digital advertising campaigns to increase our applications and subsequent enrollment, and help promote our wonderful brand," says Mehrzad Boroujerdi, Director of SPIA.



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
