DID YOU KNOW? <u>Housing Policy Debate</u> (HPD) is an international academic journal that publishes original research that evaluates and informs housing and community development policy. Subjects include affordable housing, neighborhood revitalization, housing-related poverty alleviation and integration strategies, and metropolitan development trends. The Journal also aims to explore linkages between housing policy and finance, energy, environmental, and transportation policies through interdisciplinary approaches. HPD was originally founded and published by the Fannie Mae Foundation in 1989. It was not just a trade publication promoting Fannie Mae but a rigorously researched academic product. In 2008, former UAP Professor Robert Lang (also formerly at the Fannie Mae Foundation) brought HPD to Virginia Tech as part of the Metropolitan Institute. In 2010, UAP Professor Tom Sanchez became editor and led the transition from a quarterly to bi-monthly publication as well as extending the scope of published research from domestic to international. The current impact factor is 1.786 and HPD's SCImago journal ranking (SCJ) is 22 out of 181 within Urban Studies.
